Mrs. Gunaseeli or Guna as she was affectionately called, wife of Rev. Dr. Vincent Manoharan, Founder Member of the National Dalit Christian Watch (NDCW); passed away on October 06, 2024. She was born on May 05. 1954.

Guna started her career as a Field Worker in the Peoples Education for Action and Liberation (PEAL), Madurai before joining the Central Excise Department in 1979. She took voluntary retirement to accompany Dr Vincent Manoharan during his Doctoral Studies in Birmingham, UK.

Guna founded the Mahalir Shakthi (translated as Women's Power) in 2005, an Organization committed to the empowerment of marginalized women and the educational empowerment of children from the slums of Madurai.

Guna is well known locally, nationally, and internationally for her concern for Dalits and the marginalized communities, especially women and children; her passion for active involvement in their struggles and challenges; and her commitment to their development and liberation.

Guna's quiet strength, depth of conviction and determination will inspire many to follow in her footsteps. She is a strong person with a deep Dalit rights conviction

We express our heartfelt condolences to Rev. Dr. Vincent Manoharan and his family; and pray that God may comfort them and grant them courage to bear this great loss.



A Stakeholders Meeting at Pillar Campus, Madurai

On the 18th of July, 2024, a significant gathering took place at the Pillar Campus in Madurai, marking a crucial step forward in the National Dalit Christian Women's (NDCW) mission to support and empower the Dalit Christian community. Sr. Manju provided an overview of NDCW's profile, vision, mission, objectives, and the current status of Dalit Christians. Dr. Richard then shared vital statistics on Dalit Christians and Dalit Bishops in various churches, recounted NDCW's past activities,

The voices of the community were heard loud and clear when Mr. Joseph from the Ayyampati Dalit community spoke about the discrimination they faced within the church and how NDCW stood by them in their struggles. He highlighted the partial recognition of their status and their ongoing fight for rights. Das Prakash from Kottapalyam, Trichy, echoed these sentiments, discussing issues such as taxes, separate cemeteries, and funeral arrangements. These narratives sparked a lively discussion on current atrocities and views.

This stakeholders meeting at Pillar Campus, Madurai, was more than just a gathering; it was a pivotal moment in the journey towards empowering the Dalit Christian community. With such a dedicated and diverse group of stakeholders, the future looks promising for the NDCW and its mission.

17th August 2024 at CBCI Conference Centre, New Delhi





RECOGNITION OF NDCW BY THE COMMUNITY

A PATH TO EMPOWERMENT



The National Dalit Christian Watch (NDCW) has earned widespread recognition as a Dalit Christians, voice for addressing systemic issues of caste-based discrimination within the church and society. One such example comes from a Dalit CSI Christian family in Sawyerpuram, Thoothukudi district, where members have challenges in navigating discrimination embedded within church structures.

When they reached out to the International Dalit Solidarity Network (IDSN) for guidance, IDSN connected them with NDCW. Through this network, they came into contact with Mr. Shekhar, Convenor in the Tamil Nadu chapter, who in turn directed them to the NDCW leadership. This act of connecting communities shows the significant trust and recognition NDCW has earned at both national and international levels for being a dedicated platform that advocates for equal rights, especially within faith-based institutions.

Many such families, who experience similar struggles, seek membership in NDCW as they believe in its vision of addressing castebased discrimination and uplifting marginalized communities. The recognition NDCW receives isn't just from organizations but from individuals and communities who see the organization as a beacon of hope. They aspire to become active members of the NDCW ecosystem to not only find solutions for their own struggle but to also help their fellow people combat discrimination within the church.
